Shotgun House Receives a Governor's Award

The Conservancy's rehabilitation of the Shotgun House as a Preservation Resource Center has received its second prestigious state-wide award. Established in 1986, the Governor's Historic Preservation Awards are presented annually under the sponsorship of the California Office of Historic Preservation (OHP) and California State Parks to projects, individuals, and organizations whose contributions demonstrate significant achievements in preserving the heritage of California.

Like the recently received California Preservation Foundation Design Award, the Governor's Award recognizes the lengthy community effort which saved the house and enabled the Conservancy to partner with the City of Santa Monica to rehabilitate it for use as a Preservation Resource Center and Conservancy headquarters.



New Mills Act Contracts Approved

At the October 25th City Council meeting, Santa Monica's most important preservation incentive was granted to the owners of two designated city landmarks, 504 Pier Avenue and 305 Alta Avenue, and six contributing structures within the San Vicente Boulevard Courtyard Apartments Historic District. A Mills Act contract enables a property tax reduction for owners who commit to an approved plan of restoration and maintenance.

The properties represent a diverse selection of Santa Monica's recently designated structures. The two-story E.J. Vawter house at 504 Pier is a rare hybrid example of Queen Anne and American Foursquare styles. It was designated a City Landmark in September 2014 based on its unique architecture, association with the locally prominent Vawter family, and exemplary representation of the shift from rural to urban culture

in Ocean Park during the early 20th century.

The two-story Mel Uhl house at 305 Alta is a Mediterranean/Classical Revival-styled single-family residence. It was designated in August 2015 as an embodiment of the early



Visitors to the Shotgun House can attest to the beauty of the golden currant, coyote mint and other native plants surrounding it.. Lorraine Sanchez began tending to the drought-resistant garden soon after she became a docent at the Preservation Resource

Center. Her first experience with gardening occurred in the late '90s in Ecuador while working for the Peace Corps when she realized that local women needed better access to healthy foods. Upon her return to California in 2000, she completed a Master Garden Program, pioneered a drought-tolerant front yard in her neighborhood, and took advantage of Santa Monica's grant program for water-wise landscaping.

Sanchez is a mother of four who has enjoyed a long and successful career as a nurse in pediatrics and epidemiology, an assistant professor, and an administrator. She has adventured

extensively— hiking parts of the Inca Trail, cruising the Rhone River, flying over the Atacama Desert, and canoeing (and capsizing) on a tributary of the Amazon.

Sanchez was first introduced to the Conservancy by Tom Cleys when they both served on the board of Sunset Park's neighborhood organization. "For years I've been interested in architecture and design and as an outgrowth of this interest was drawn to the Conservancy...

When we travel to cities in other countries we enjoy seeing history in their architecture and art. In the United States we deserve to see our history in our architecture and art."

Beach House docents are busy planning the fifth annual Happy Birthday Marion! celebration, taking place on Sunday, January 15, 11 am - 2 pm at The Annenberg Community Beach House. The party, sponsored by the City of Santa Monica in conjunction with the Conservancy, is free and open to the public.

While paying tribute to the talented film actress Marion Davies, docents hope to transport guests back to the late '20s, '30s and early '40s when Marion hosted grand parties at The Beach House, then known as the "Versailles of Hollywood." Docents will be decked out in vintage attire and guests are also encouraged to arrive in vintage clothing. Live music by the L.A. Love Band, dancing (with

the participation of Arthur Murray studio dancers), entertainment and refreshments will add to the festivities.

Marion Davies biographer Lara Fowler will be on hand to talk about William Randolph Hearst and screen home movie footage taken from Hearst and Marion's European travels. Film historian Elaina Archer will introduce the 1928 film "Show People," a delightful look at Old Hollywood in which Marion co-starred with William Haines. Party attendees might even catch a glimpse of Old Hollywood luminaries such as Marion's good friend Charlie Chaplin, and screen stars Harpo Marx and Jean Harlow. Shotgun House Welcomes Its 1000th Visitor

This August, the Santa Monica Conservancy welcomed its 1000th and 1001st visitors, Mike and Megan Lampkin of Santa Monica, to its Preservation Resource Center in Ocean Park. The Lampkins are originally from the Bay area, and although they are neighbors and have walked the area many times, this was their first visit to the Shotgun House. The couple was presented with a book about shotgun houses.

Since opening in January, the Preservation Resource Center has been visited by local residents as well as guests from other states and countries (Australia, Germany and Colombia, to name a few). One visitor, Karen Noonan, shared her experiences of actually living in this Shotgun House in the 1960s, nearly 60 years before it was rehabilitated and re-purposed by the Conservancy.

A primary goal of the Center is to assist property owners and the community with information about the methods and benefits of preservation. This year at least five homeowners were assisted in understanding the requirements for formal designation of their historic properties and two are now preparing appli-



cations. "Providing such assistance demonstrates the value of our Center as a readily accessible resource for preservation help," notes Conservancy President Carol Lemlein.

The Preservation Resource Center is open to the public from 11 am to 2 pm every Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday as well as by appointment.

The New California Incline

The California Incline was built to allow pedestrians to get to the beach from the bluffs in Santa Monica. It has been featured in various mainstream media, including "It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World" (1963), "Knocked Up" (2007), and the popular video game "Grand Theft Auto V."

The Incline was completed in 1896, a dirt road carved out of the bluffs, and later used by horse-drawn wagons hauling freight. In 1905 it was opened to vehicular traffic and became a modern thoroughfare, accommodating cars

and pedestrians traveling between Pacific Coast Highway and Ocean Avenue. Over time its seismic safety was compromised and the crumbling sidewalk alongside it became unsafe.

The City of Santa Monica, with the help of federal funds, demolished and reconstructed the Incline over two years. The four-foot-wide sidewalk was replaced by a wider, smoothly-paved road with clearly marked lanes for bikes and people, shielding them from passing cars with a concrete barrier. The iconic, porcelain-coated Santa Monica sign that stood at the Incline's base has been preserved and now features energy efficient lights. The new outside rail also recreates the archway motif of the old bridge. Although the bluffs along the Incline appear the same, they are actually reinforced with a thousand special nails drilled into the soil. These preserve the weather-worn appearance of the bluffs while strengthening the area in the event of an earthquake.

The new Incline was unveiled to the public on September 1, 2016.

Breisch on the LA Central Library

Preservation Awards Guidelines

Specifying a category for your nomination isn't required, but the definitions below may be helpful:

Restoration: bringing a building back to its historically authentic condition.

Rehabilitation: bringing a historic resource back into service, including projects that conform to the Secretary of Interior Standards for Treatment of Historic Properties.

Renovation: remodeling and renewing, or mixing modern design in with appropriate work on a historic building.

Adaptive Reuse: adapting a historic structure to a new use, ideally with minimal impact on the structure's character-defining features.

Stewardship: long-term care and maintenance of a historic building or place.

In addition, the Conservancy recognizes outstanding individuals, groups and organizations with **President's, Volunteer, and Service Awards**, and occasionally the **David G. Cameron Preservation Award** in recognition of outstanding accomplishments in preserving Santa Monica's unique heritage and for promoting the value of historic preservation in the City.

Landmarks Commission Report

Landmark status has been awarded to a cluster of buildings and parcels on Ocean Front Walk, well known to Santa Monicans and beach visitors who have utilized them for food, lodging and other commercial offerings since the early 1900s. The application for the designation was filed by nearby resident Louise Steiner, with considerable community support. The designation recognizes the cluster's association with the history of the Santa Monica Pier recreation area. With the possible exception of Hot Dog on a Stick, Perry's, and bicycle rental facilities, the structures are the last remaining commercial enterprises on the Santa Monica beachfront south of the pier.

The earliest structure, a one-story brick building at 1611-13 Ocean Front Walk constructed in 1917 during the heyday of this popular amusement area, is presently a souvenir shop that had previously been a fish market, food establishment and shooting gallery. The 1921 two-story brick building at 1601-03 has housed Carousel Foods and a gift shop since the 1960s. To its immediate south at 1605-09 is a 1924 structure, which has housed various food and clothing emporiums and has been the site of the Overlook Hotel since 1925. At 1615, also built in 1925, has been occupied by Big Dean's Café for many years but has been so remodeled that only its site, not the structure, was included in the designation. Finally 1619, a bicycle rental facility dating from 1979, is part of the designation only with respect to its site.

The Commission has designated two rela-

tively intact and rare Craftsman bungalows at 2102 Fifth Street as structures of merit. The rear wood frame, one-story structure was constructed in 1912 by Swedish immigrant George Pearson and his wife, Olive. They rented it out but later moved in with their children from 1921 to 1928 when they constructed a second building in the front of the lot, renting out the rear house.

The longstanding Sears building in downtown Santa Monica may have a new look if the adaptive reuse concept and schematic plans presented to the Commission for discussion are approved. Upon entering the landmarked building at 3rd and Colorado Avenue, visitors will find themselves in a central atrium, accommodating a two-story food and retail court, with a glass skylight lighting the area below. In addition, Seritage Growth Properties, owners of the department store building, plan a roof addition creating third floor office spaces. The proposed new uses and design take into account the building's proximity to the Expo terminus and along the Colorado Esplanade, thereby servicing a variety of downtown visitors.

development of the Palisades Tract and as an excellent example of its architectural style.

The San Vicente Historic District was designated in December 2015 as Santa Monica's most significant and cohesive concentration of architecturally noteworthy courtyard buildings constructed between 1930 and 1953 featuring abundant open green space and harmonious scale. The contributing buildings represent a variety of architectural styles on San Vicente Blvd.:

- 150-156, Overcliff Manor, a Mid-Century Modern apartment complex
- 212, the only Streamline Moderne-styled apartment complex in the district
- 234, Villa Vicente, a Mid-Century Modern apartment complex
- 302-312, The Nida Apartments, one of the

few American Colonial Revival-styled complexes in the district

- 437-441, a Minimal Traditional apartment complex
- 614-618, an apartment complex combining American Colonial Revival style with Hollywood Regency elements in a stylistic courtyard setting

These properties bring the City's total number of Mills Act contracts to 71, with the reduction in the City's property tax receipts for these six properties estimated at \$34,745 beginning in FY 2017-2018. The actual amount of the property tax reduction will be set by the County Tax Assessor's office, which must determine the value of the historic property based upon its current net operating income, rather than upon the traditional assessed valuation method, resulting, in most cases, in a property tax reduction.
